As you're now aware, I've included a few stories from the above book in previous issues of 'The Link' and would like to share one more with you. I have enjoyed these books very much and would commend them to you.

A Church Minister was being interviewed on television. His wife had been a Deacon in the Anglican Church. She had died, just two weeks earlier. The day she was ordained she had been told that she had leukaemia. "After the initial shock," he said. "she made it clear that she didn't agree with God about it".

I warmed to that. Our discipleship shouldn't make us unthinking zombies, accepting everything that happens without question. We have a right, even a duty, to use the minds God gave us. Not simply to repeat the well-worn platitudes.

"Did prayer help?" he was asked. A thoughtful pause. "Yes but don't ask me how. Prayer is learning to rest in God."

Resting in God. After the questioning, and not necessarily getting the answer you want, or think you need, resting in him is all there is. Leaving it with him, even when we disagree. Relying on his love.

I get less and less satisfied with the sort of prayer that's constant petition. Of course asking is part of prayer, but it tends to take over. I suspect it's the activist in us - we want things done, decisions made, goals accomplished.

But in the end, the relationship between God and me has to go beyond that - to resting. Learning simply to sit with him, quietly. Leaving the final decisions with him. They're his anyway, and if he's not competent to deal with them, nobody is.

*And so I ask, Lord, not necessarily to understand the way things are,
But just to find the grace to rest in you. To let my problems wait, to still my mind
And in the blessed peace and quiet that comes when I relax, and lift my arms,
Surrender to your presence and in your nearness find that's all I need.*

I would like to thank both the regular members of the choir, and those who augmented it at Easter and other times for their continued support and enthusiasm over the spring and summer months. Your help and loyalty are much appreciated

Our thoughts will shortly be turning towards Christmas. Personally, I am not sure if future Christmas services will be in their traditional form or not but I am assuming that , for this year, it will be business as usual and I have been thinking about possible music the choir could sing. As I have said before, the choir rise to whatever challenges are presented to them. Sometimes, however, there is safety in numbers and if we had some more bodies we could perhaps widen our repertoire. If anyone would like to come into the choir for the Christmas period then please have a word with me.

The Commonwealth Games are over but every Sunday we have at hand a rich common wealth of resources from around the world. CH4 contains hymns and tunes written by authors and musicians from New Zealand, South Africa and other African countries, the Americas ,Europe, the countries and islands of Asia and of course from the Home Nations. What I find interesting is that the wide tapestry of thought contained in CH4 challenges us to think of the different situations which confront us on a daily basis.

Metrical psalms, which have played a large part in Scottish worship for centuries, feature prominently in CH4. I want to mention Andrew Mitchell Thomson, who was born in 1778/1779 in Sanquhar in Dumfriesshire. He was educated at Markinch. He left Edinburgh University in 1820 and although he was licensed to preach by the Presbytery of Kelso he first of all became a teacher, at Markinch, before serving as minister at Sprouston in Roxburghshire, then at the East Church in Perth, at New Greyfriars in Edinburgh, and finally at St. George's Church in Edinburgh when it was opened in 1814. He was an agitator for the abolition of slavery in the British Colonies. Although St. George's, on the west side of Charlotte Square, is now West Register House, it lives on in psalmody because Andrew Thomson wrote a tune which he named after his church, "St. George's Edinburgh" which accompanies the words "Ye gates, lift up your heads on high"

Alex Waugh

An Appreciation

We were all saddened to hear of the passing away of Alex Waugh on Thursday 24th July. It was only a few short weeks ago that he told us about the tests that he had carried out at hospital and the diagnosis and we were all aware of the seriousness of the situation.

Alex was born at Wadingburn, grew up in Lasswade and attended, the then, Strathesk Church. He was ordained as an elder more than 50 years ago on 27th March 1960 and he diligently carried out his duties, visiting those in his district regularly (not necessarily church members) and he also undertook hospital, care home and home visits to those who were unable to attend church. Over and above his duties as an elder Alex, in the early/mid 1950s held office in the Men's Guild of Strathesk Church and subsequently became the leader of the Youth Fellowship of Lasswade Parish Church. In later years he was the President of the Lothian Presbytery Office Bearers Union and played an active part in the church bowling club. Alex will be missed for the work he did but also for being in church on a Sunday morning. He was a big part of our church family.

Alex had a wide range of interests outside the church which spanned many years. He worked for Social Services in the Craigmillar district for over 30 years. He was a Local Councillor and it is after him that Bonnyrigg's Waugh Path is named. He was a Special Constable and this enabled him to police the traffic going in and out of the Park on Summer Fair days for a number of years. He also officiated at Murrayfield, Musselburgh Races and Tynecastle Park. He was also a staunch supporter of the Local History Society for a long time and held the position of Vice Chairman for a while and in that Organisation, just as in the church, his gift of being able to talk to people and make them feel welcome endeared him to many.

In his life he touched many lives and the attendance at his funeral at Mortonhall reflected this. Rev. Wendy Drake conducted a very uplifting service after which someone remarked that it was good to hear people singing. One of the hymns that was chosen was "Thine be the glory" which must have been a special favourite because Margaret and Alex requested it for the service following their Diamond Wedding in March of this year.

Everyone will have their own memories of Alex but probably we shall remember him for just being Alex. Alex, we thank you for the contribution which you made to the lives of so many people.

Our thoughts at this time are with Margaret, Fiona and Heather and their families.

Bonnyrigg and Lasswade Local History Society

The Society was founded in 1982 and continues to meet on the third Wednesday of each month from October to April, excepting December, in The Pitcairn Centre, Bonnyrigg Church Halls at 7.30pm. We have a speaker on, usually, a local history topic and then there is a “cuppa” which provides an opportunity for members to speak to one another and/or to talk to the speaker informally if they wish to raise a point of interest with our guest.

In recent years one of the highlights of the session has been the Dr. Mary Noble Memorial Award Presentation. Dr. Noble graduated with an Honours Degree in Botany from Edinburgh University and went on to produce an outstanding thesis on the effects of fungi on seeds. Because of their mutual interest in mycology (the science of fungi) Dr. Noble became fascinated in the life and works of Beatrix Potter. Dr. Noble was also a very keen golfer and was for a spell the Ladies Captain at Broomieknowe. She was also very interested in local history and was one of the founding members of the Local History Society in 1982.

In recent years the Society has benefited from a sum of money left to it in her will. We felt that it would be in line with her wishes to create an annual competition between the local Primary Schools with a monetary award and a cup being presented to the winners. Topics for each year's challenge are chosen by the Society as a means of encouraging children in the primary 5 age range to undertake research into local history. The 2014/15 challenge is on Castles or Stately Homes of Midlothian, with each school selecting one castle of their choice and researching not just the history of the building but the history of the families, or some of them, who lived there and also any folklore connected to the property.

As usual, the Society is always looking for new members- and not just “people of a certain age” - but younger citizens too. Our provisional syllabus for the 2014/15 session is given below and all new members will be very welcome. It may be that one topic appeals to you and if you want to come just to that one then you will be equally welcome. I look forward to welcoming you. Dr. Elsie Maud Inglis

This year marks the 150th anniversary of the birth of Dr. Inglis whose name will be well known to many of you. The information which follows might be of interest.

Elsie Inglis was born in 1864 at a hill station in the Himalayas. Her father, John, was an Indian civil servant and her mother, Harriet Thomson, was the daughter of an Indian civilian. Elsie had two older brothers and a younger sister, Eva. When she was small her nursing powers were obvious. She painted little red spots over the faces and bodies of her family of 40 dolls because an epidemic of measles had broken out and as her patients recovered the spots were wiped off each doll until the epidemic was over. In 1876 her father retired and the family, before returning to Scotland, spent some time in Tasmania where Elsie's two brothers were living. It was Elsie who instituted school colours for the college she attended by sewing blue and white ribbon on to a safety pin and wearing it on the lapel of her coat.

Elsie Inglis received her first medical lesson at Edinburgh School of Medicine but women medical students acquired knowledge to take degrees under very difficult conditions – in fact Elsie went to Glasgow where conditions to study clinical work were easier than in Edinburgh. She qualified in 1892 and pioneered the way for women to study medicine. She became a surgeon at the old Bruntsfield Hospital in Edinburgh and she opened the way for ladies to receive proper medical attention because, until then, they were treated as second class citizens medically wise – they could not, for example, undergo operations without their husbands' consent. Dr. Inglis set up a small maternity unit at 219 High Street in Edinburgh (and there is a plaque to commemorate this above Celtic Connections) before a larger and more complete maternity hospital bearing her name was set up in the Abbeyhill district.

When war broke out in 1914 she offered her services to the Royal Army Medical Core but they turned her down because she was a lady but she beavered away and finally set up a hospital, staffed by ladies, in the Paris area to treat the casualties from the fields of operations. She organised the setting up of similar mobile, all ladies, hospitals in Serbia, Greece, Romania, Corsica, and Russia, all centres of war.

Ill health caught up with her and in 1917 she had to return to the UK and died the day after she landed at Newcastle. Her funeral service was held in St. Giles Cathedral where there is a plaque to her memory and she is buried in the Dean Cemetery in Edinburgh. She was a remarkable lady and the work started by her perseverance continues today.

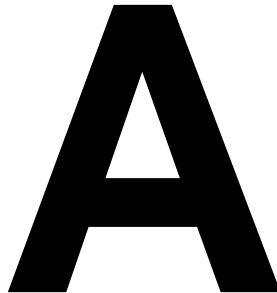
Our final Wednesday evening saunter was a short walk round Penicuik using part of the Old Railway Line.

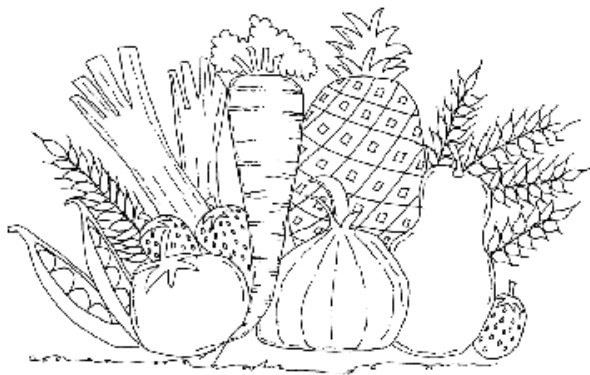
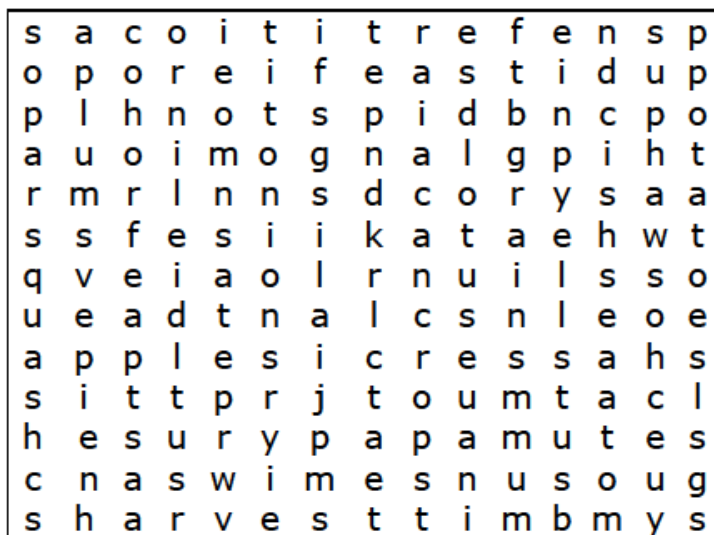
